Your article

exclusively in Word format (.doc or .docx)

- Articles should not **exceed 8000 words** by “Word” standard (including footnotes and bibliography)
- **Police** : Times New Roman, 12 p.,
- 2 short **abstracts in English and in French** (100 words each at the most) must be included.
- You must provide **a list of keywords** (5 maximum)
- **Illustrations must feature in the document** as well as in a separate .jpeg file.

Abbreviations and acronyms

Acronyms should be spelt out if they are not quoted in leading dictionaries even though they may seem to be in general use. Similarly, if specific abbreviations are used, their meaning must be clarified.

Quotations

Quotations not exceeding 2 lines will be placed within the text, in quotation marks. Longer quotations will be set off without quotation marks.

An ellipsis in a quotation must be indicated with [...].

Quotations in other languages than English or French must be translated.

References will follow the quotations **between brackets** with only the author's name, the year of publication followed by a coma and the page number. Ex: (CAIRNS 1991: 30-31).

If your bibliography shows several references in the same year for a specific author, use a, b, etc... Ex: (CAIRNS 2001b: 33-34).

Typography

Use English norms, in particular: use exclusively English quotation marks (“...””) for texts in English.

For quotations incorporated into another quotation, use '...!.

Commas and periods that directly follow quotations must be placed inside the closing quotation marks. All other punctuation marks that do not belong to the quoted text are placed outside.

Footnotes

- Footnotes must **not exceed 3 lines**.
- Do not use footnotes to give bibliographical references. Keep **references in the text**. Ex: (CAIRNS 1991: 30-31).
- However if you **need to provide online references** for your sources (Parliamentary papers, newspapers, online reports...), **use footnotes** to do it instead of the bibliography section at the end.
Ex: ⁵: GOVERNMENT OF CANADA (1996), *Report of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples*, Ottawa: Minister of Supply and Services, <http://www.ainc-inac.gc.ca/ch/rcap/>
- **Footnote anchors** must immediately follow the word and be placed before any punctuation sign whatsoever.
- Footnotes must be placed at the **bottom of the page**.

Bibliography (at the end of the article)

- Presentation of your bibliography must be in compliance with the principles illustrated below.
- Please note that the author's surnames must be in **capitals**, followed by the complete first name. Page references are necessary.
- references to websites should normally be placed in footnotes (see above), unless central to the sources quoted in the bibliography.
- No more than 15-20 entries if possible.

Tables, figures, photos and various illustrations

They must be in black and white, in .JPEG format and with a resolution allowing an excellent print quality. They must correspond to the format of the journal (11.5 x 16.5 cm). If they exceed 4 cm. in height, authors may be asked to adapt their text in order to allow sufficient space for those documents.
